

**Fall Schedule 2011: Painting**

The painting program at KCAI creates an environment in which students can explore the processes, ideas, and media that interest them. Students studying painting become aware of many different artistic practices through slide lectures, readings, and discussion, and the diversity of students' visions is valued through ongoing dialog with the instructor focused on individual artistic development. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors have their own studio space so that this development has a place to occur and so that a learning-focused community of students can be created in which students enjoy intellectual inquiry and critique. Shifts in the ways artists have created work over the past 20 years or more have resulted in artists being viewed as cultural workers whose ideas dictate their materials, rather than creators who are defined by one chosen medium. As a result, expected learning outcomes include a willingness to experiment with a wide range of processes, all of which are viewed through the lens of the history of painting. To aid this learning, instructors meet with their students individually every week to discuss their work and their material concerns and ideas and to help the student to understand their choices, recognize problems, and develop a vocabulary for talking about their work. Additional expected learning outcomes for painting students include the development of productive studio habits, a strong work ethic, and solid research skills. Presentation skills are equally valued, and students learn to formally present and discuss their own work and analyze the work of their peers.

## **Sophomore Program**

### **First semester sophomore:**

#### **PAIT 200-01 Sophomore Painting**

**6.0 credit hours**

This course is an introduction to the process of painting. The focus will be twofold; the first is learning about the basic process of painting, the second is understanding what ideas motivate the individual. Perceptual drawing skills, study of color and an encouragement of finding visual relationships in the world around them will be emphasized. Students will learn how to restrict their investigations by setting up basic visual problems that they find interesting. A three-dimensional structure will be constructed and studied for greater understanding of spatial problems. Students will be introduced to the past and present issues of painting and discuss the relevance of these issues as it pertains to their own ideas.

The class will be structured in the following order: Collecting information in a journal, drawing from observation, color studies, master studies, building a 3-dimensional study of a painting, painting from the 3-dimensional model.

#### **PAIT 200-02 Sophomore Painting**

**6.0 credit hours**

This course is designed for the beginning sophomore to develop their ability to manipulate fundamental materials and techniques of oil painting (i.e. structure, color, form), and to develop a strong base of technical knowledge and skill in analytical visual critique (i.e. visual metaphor, material process). As well as stressing fundamentals of painting and visual critique through life painting, students will be free to explore individual interests and subject matter in their studios, while also focusing on building a solid skill-base through individual exploration of artistic influences and interests. Working from historical and contemporary models of painting, as well as the creation of a body of individual work, the student will come to a clear understanding of various painted morphologies, and begin to develop analytical discourse surrounding the formal and conceptual content inherent in these works. Students will develop an independent visual language, as well as a personal philosophy of image-making.

### **Second semester sophomore:**

#### **PAIT 220-02 Sophomore Painting**

**6.0 credit hours**

This introductory course in painting covers fundamental issues relating to formal, technical, and historical aspects. Students will be exposed to the perceptual and conceptual methods of decision making, gradually leading to the development of personal expression. Individual and group class critiques will occur throughout the semester.

### **Junior Program**

#### **PAIT 300 Junior Painting I**

**5.0 credit hours**

**Course Description:** This course is designed to facilitate an intense exploration of ideas and themes as well as encourage conceptual and technical risk-taking. Students will develop research methodologies and self-awareness of how their research influences their visual and conceptual problem solving. Students will practice self-assessment daily in the studio and in midterm self-assessment forms and conferences. The instructor will meet with students individually and in groups to discuss student's work, art theory and professional concerns. The instructor will give slide lectures, lead discussions, and provide exposure to a wide variety of relevant material.

**General Course Goals:** This course seeks to challenge students to take risks, experiment with materials and ideas, develop a working vocabulary of critical terms, become aware of historical and contemporary themes and strategies in their field, and continue to understand who they are and can become as artists.

**Learning outcomes:** Throughout the semester, students will cultivate a disciplined studio practice through which they will develop individual conceptual and visual vocabularies. Reading and writing assignments as well as critiques are intended to broaden the Student's critical abilities and theoretical awareness. **Senior Program**

**PAIT 400 Senior Painting Sections**

**5.0 credit hours**

**Course Description:** This course is designed to direct the students attention to building a focused body of work to be presented at the thesis exhibition, while at the same time continuing to experiment and take risks in his or her work. Seniors will continue to develop the good studio and research habits that are necessary to nurture and sustain their on going studio practice. Emphasis will be placed on understanding the conceptual implications and strategies implicit in their work and finding relationships to other artists dealing with similar issues. Students will be assessed in group and individual critiques and will practice self-assessment daily in the studio and on midterm self-assessment forms and in conferences with the instructor. The professor will meet with students individually and in groups to discuss students work, art theory and professional concerns. The instructor will give slide lectures, lead discussions, and provide exposure to a wide variety of relevant material.

**General Course Goals:** This course seeks to challenge students to create a unified body of work, develop a working vocabulary of critical terms, become aware of historical and contemporary themes and strategies in their field, and continue to understand who they are and can become as artists.

**Learning outcomes:** Throughout the semester, students will cultivate a disciplined studio practice through which they will develop individual conceptual and visual vocabularies. Reading and writing assignments as well as critiques are intended to broaden the student's critical abilities and theoretical awareness. The student will complete several written assignments relating to the professional practice of being an artist as well as give a presentation on their working processes and research. Students will employ critical thinking to pose problems visually. Students will gain an increased professional awareness. Graduating seniors will create a thesis body of work and participate in the Senior Thesis Exhibitions on campus and at the H&R Block Artspace.

### **Drawing electives**

#### **PADR 369-01 Referencing the Landscape**

**3.0 credit hours**

#### **PADRE 369-01 (for non-majors)**

This class will focus on the landscape as a point of reference for image making. During the first half of the semester the class will go to various locations off campus to directly observe the landscape. While on location the class will collect information and form concepts to challenge their studio processes. The second half of the semester will focus on pushing the different concepts that were discovered while out in the environment. Students will be taught how to use a specific source as a restriction thus allowing them to investigate both traditional and more experimental image making.

**PADR 382-01 Experience and the narrative****3.0 credit hours****PADRE 382-01 (for non-majors)****CASLE 382-01**

This class will examine the relationship between personal experience and the creation of narrative drawings. It challenges the student to take on an experience that may be foreign to them, or explore a passion they have not yet been able to address in their work or other classes, and consider the ways in which this experience can translate into elements that make up a visual narrative. This class is for serious students who are interested in creating an ethical response to world problems in formal, procedural and conceptual ways that creates a meaningful studio practice. On Tuesdays, students will be volunteering at a site of their choice (Bike Collective, a soup kitchen, Rose Brooks, etc). On Thursdays students will meet in class to draw and discuss.

**PADR 385-80 Drawing: Abstraction Today****3.0 credit hours****PADRE 385-80 (for non-majors)**

The class will focus on current ideas, trends, and critical methodologies in the field of contemporary abstraction including materials as content, metaphorical structures within abstraction, combining representational images and abstraction, and a unit that examines the fluid and poetic concepts of French post-modern philosopher Gilles Deleuze. Our objective is to open new realms of knowledge, new ways of seeing that can be immediately applied furthering a unique and meaningful personal aesthetic. We will review Clement Greenberg's essay, Modernist Painting, that codified the basic tenets of modern abstraction that continues to be an indispensable source for definition and discourse. The class will also trace the historical antecedents of contemporary abstraction, especially Russian Constructivism at the turn of the 20th century. Students will work in the studio and be expected to take part in rigorous dialogues informal and informal critiques and discussions.

**PADR 353-01 Meta-Drawing****3.0 credit hours****PADRE 353-01 (for non-majors)**

This course explores drawing as an epistemological tool. How does drawing reflect thought? How do we derive symbolism or metaphor from the act of drawing? We will examine these questions as well as themes pertaining to objectivity, form, expression, and representation through the lens of contemporary art. Class assignments will focus on nontraditional materials and procedures that broaden the concept of drawing. Presentations will focus on artists whose work addresses the subject of drawing through sculpture, readymades, and printed matter.

**PADR 349-40 Drawing Systems****3.0 credit hours****PADRE 349-40 (for non-majors)**

Drawing Systems focuses on the subjective and cultural use of symbols and structures to achieve a given expressive, persuasive, or conceptual aim. Students will work both to inspect and examine agency in creating two-dimensional works in both representational and abstract languages. Classroom discussions will involve notions of systems, grids and symbols in relationship to economic, subconscious and semiotic theories relevant contemporary art. Each lesson is structured so that student's progress is cumulative. Sketchbook assignments, group critiques, and brief in-class

presentations will aid students in demonstrating their competency with drawing as an informative public system.
